NON-CREDIT CLASSES: All classes apart from Doc and WMD are 1.5 hours in length. Doc and WMD are 2 hours long

Academic English for your **Doctorate (Doc):**

A module for students working independently on a research degree (eg. PhD). The focus will be on practising and developing the language and rhetoric to explain and present your research in both written and spoken formats.

Academic Reading and vocabulary development (R&V):

In this module, students can broaden their vocabulary range and develop reading strategies.

Academic speaking and pronunciation (S&P):

A class for students who want to focus on improving their ability to participate in seminar discussions and deliver effective presentations.

Academic English (AE):

A module for all levels of students who want to improve their academic language skills such as reading academic articles and giving oral presentations. Attention is particularly focused on preparing for and writing essays, reports and dissertations.

Grammar for Academic Writing

(GAW): This module looks at different grammatical constructions typically found in different types of academic writing.

Writing your Master's dissertation

(WMD): This course is for international students currently writing or about to start writing their master's dissertations. Sessions will cover, for example, structuring the text, writing abstracts and introductions, reviewing the literature, and making claims.

The Masterclass series consists of five 1.5 hour classes. The sessions will be repeated each week:

Every Friday from February 1st - March 1st, 11:00-12:30, Arundel10212A

All classes are free, and you need only come to the specific sessions that interest you. All students are welcome, but these sessions will be of particular interest to those returning to study or from outside the UK.

Session 1 - Avoiding plagiarism: how to paraphrase and reference correctly.

Plagiarism is a very serious issue at university. This session will show you how to avoid plagiarism by paraphrasing the words of others more effectively, and how to correctly reference your sources using the APA referencing system.

Session 2 - Critical reviews & writing critically

Tue 5th February 09:30-11:00 (Arundel10212A) Fri 8th February 11:00-12:30 (Arundel10212A)

What does it mean to read and write critically? How do you go about critiquing an article by an expert? This class will look at how to improve your critical reading and writing skills.

Session 3 - Literature Reviews - Using other's work in your writing & synthesising effectively.

Tue 12th February 09:30-11:00 (Arundel10212A) Fri 15th February 11:00-12:30 (Arundel10212A)

Continuing on from Session 3, this class will look at using multiple sources of information to support your points and arguments, and how to incorporate these into your work to maximum effect.

Session 4 - Understanding Assignment & Examination Tasks

Tue 19th February 09:30-11:00 (Arundel10212A) Fri 22nd February 11:00-12:30 (Arundel10212A)

One of the key problems with exams and assignments is that students do not always answer the question asked accurately. This session will focus on analysing exam and assignment tasks quickly and recognising exactly what is being asked. We will also focus on getting the most out of your revision.

Session 5 - Proof-reading - How to check your own work

Tue 26th February 09:30-11:00 (Arundel10212A) Fri 1st March 11:00-12:30 (Arundel10212A)

This session will look at how to read your own work critically, both in terms of writing style and content. This is a key skill for those writing essays and reports, and it is also important for those students writing essays in exams.
