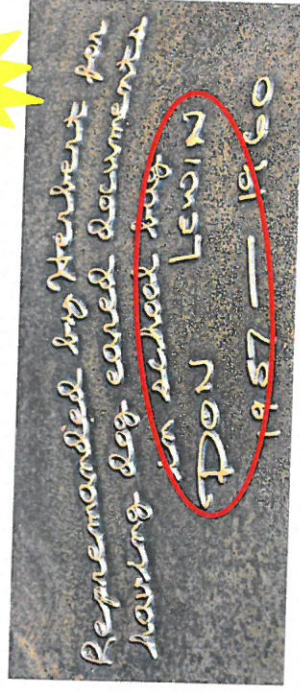


The Coat of Arms with the dragon and lion belongs to Queen Elizabeth I, the one with 2 unicorns belongs to Mary, Queen of Scots.

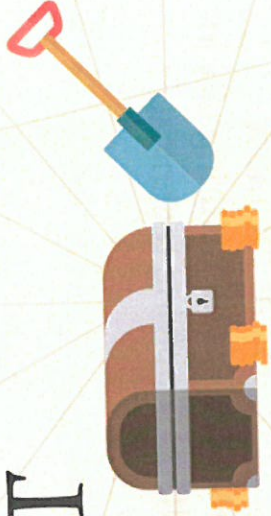

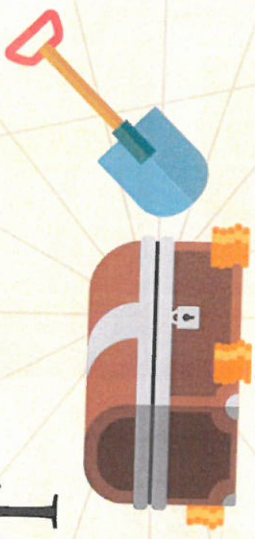


In 1874 clocks and watches were less reliable than they are today and the time they showed could vary by as much as 30 minutes. HL Brown's time signal was linked directly to Greenwich, so that the company could ensure the clock it used to set customers' timepieces by was set to Greenwich Mean Time and the people of Sheffield could set their watches.

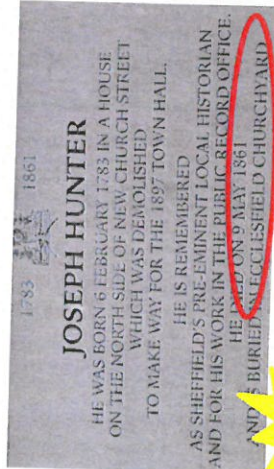

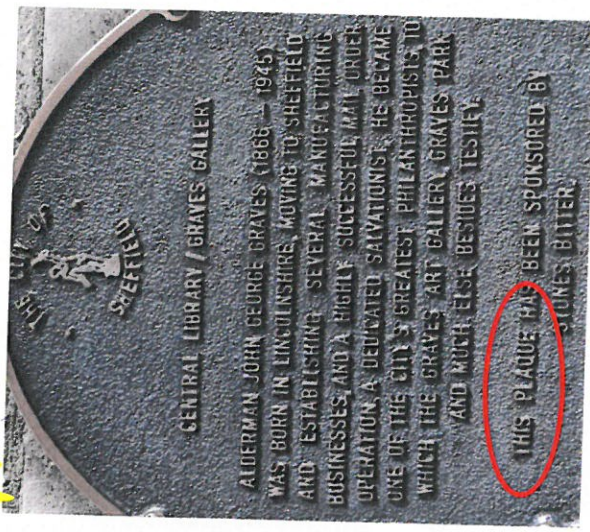


Upper Chapel, built in 1700, was the first non-conformist chapel built in Sheffield. It was built by a congregation that had become 'dissenters' by refusing to adhere to the doctrines set out by the Church of England. The 3 statues by George Fullard were placed here after his death in 1973 - with the original 'Running Woman' winning first prize in the John Moores Prize exhibition in 1957.

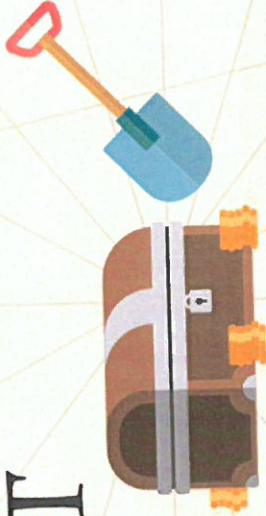

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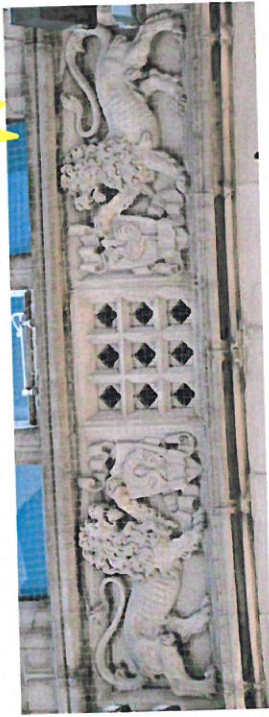

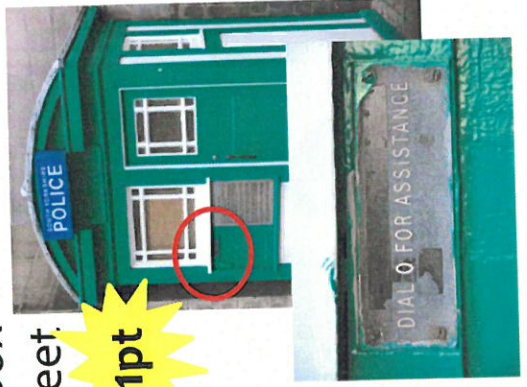


There has been a theatre on the site of the Lyceum since 1879, however the Lyceum was not built until 1897 after the previous theatre was demolished.

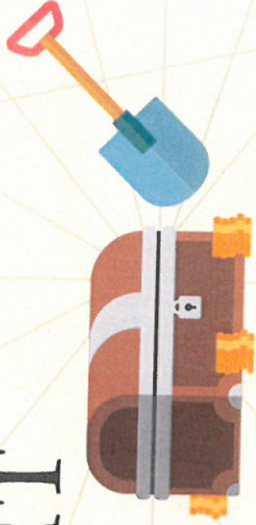


The green and white police box – which bears a striking resemblance to Dr Who's time travelling Tardis – is stationed on the corner of Surrey Street next to the Town Hall.

Queen Victoria visited Sheffield on the 21st May 1897 to officially open the Town Hall, and to celebrate her Diamond jubilee. On the 22 September 1896, Victoria surpassed George III as the longest reigning monarch in British history.

Sheffield's "Women Of Steel" is a tribute to the women who kept the munitions factories working to help win two world wars

B2. Sign of the smitten rear

Pop Gregory a teacher at the Leopold school found particularly glee in using "the sign of the smitten rear" on the homework of pupils. The sign was a large cross containing a dot in each of the four sectors and, after distributing homework, Pop always waited an age before giving the usual belting with a bunsen burner tube.

B3. The Head of Steam

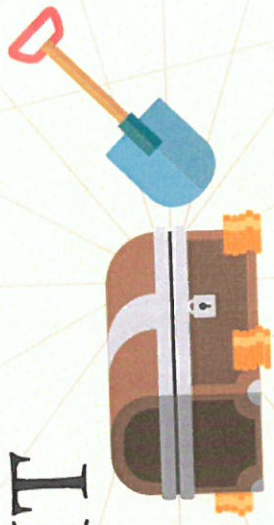
Used to be a bank before it was the Old Monk pub

In Victorian Sheffield people who lived in the city were encouraged to go to this door and collect disinfectants to use in their homes and work places to try and control vermin and disease

B10. Yorkshire House

From their purpose built premises in Barker's Pool Johnson & Appelyards became one of the biggest cabinet makers and house furnishers during the latter part of the nineteenth century.

B8. West Street

The street once housed the Jeffie Bainbridge Children's Centre, which gave food and shelter for the city's waifs and strays in the 1880s.
