- Bursary payments can only begin once you are **fully enrolled** and your degree classification has been confirmed. If you are not fully enrolled in October, your appropriate bursary amount will be rolled over into your November payment (or to the month that you become fully enrolled).
- <sup>1</sup>Trainees in Physics, Chemistry, Computing, Languages, Geography and Secondary Mathematics with a 2:1 or above are able to apply for a scholarship with the appropriate professional body. Please keep a copy of the scholarship letter, as you will need to upload this document when you complete the online bursary/scholarship form.
- <sup>2</sup>Languages scholarships are only available if you train to teach French, German or Spanish
- Bursaries are not taxable; however they may be treated as capital income for the purposes of income assessment if you receive state benefits.
- The bursary is not a salary paid in arrears.
- <sup>3</sup>Should you withdraw from, or cease to engage with the course, you would be entitled to the training bursary for each month up to and including, the month in which you withdraw.
- If you leave and then re-join your course, you will normally only be eligible to receive a bursary up to the value of the bursary award applicable in the year you started the course.
- If you undertake paid teaching work in a school or institution, you become ineligible to receive the training bursary from the date you start this work.
- If you leave your course and join a new one with no transfer of standing or credit from the previous course and are being charged a new tuition fee, you will be entitled to receive a new bursary. However, if you have already received a **full** bursary award on the previous route, you would not be eligible for another bursary.
- If you leave your course and join a new one taking advanced standing or credit to this new course, you will only be eligible for the remainder of any bursary you were receiving on the original course.
- The training bursary awards are relevant to the academic year of study and can change from year to year.
